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sure you have blown the interview. You must know as much as you can about the company. With the Internet readily available, there truly is no excuse not to be fully knowledgeable about the company before the interview.

There are many ways in which people blow their chances with a very good job opportunity, but one of the best ways to ruin your chances are showing up late to your interview.
