


5 Things Not to Say during an Interview

 - 1. "Sorry, the traffic was bad."

Leave early enough to account for bad traffic or something else to go wrong so that there is no chance of you being late. If you arrive super early, just sit in your car or in a café near the building where you are interviewing until ten minutes before the interview is scheduled.

2. "How did you get hired here?"

Don't ask personal questions. Remember, you are the one being interviewed. This question also implies that they got their job because they were lucky, knew someone, or are not qualified for it. Keep your questions and comments on simple small talk topics.

3. "I don't know."

This is not an acceptable answer to any question if you seriously want the job. No matter how difficult the question may be, attempt to answer it or come up with an explanation on how you would find the answer.

4. "I don't have any questions."

You should arrive at every interview with pre-planned questions. Do the proper research before so that you know what makes a good question and isn't something you should have known by reading their website before. Easy questions to ask: "What is a typical day like?" or "How is performance measured?"
